Safer Internet Day 2020

As you know we take internet safety very seriously and so we support the fantastic 'Safer Internet Day' initiative each year. This special day took place on **Tuesday 11th February**, with children focusing on how the internet can be used safely and how to avoid the various threats they face online, especially if they have unsupervised access.

- The children in **FS2** learned about keeping their identity private online. Though a difficult concept for our younger children to understand they talked about keeping information private and to always 'Tell! Tell! Tell!' if anything makes them uncomfortable!
- The children of **Y1** learned what to do if they see something that they do not like online. They learned that they *must* also 'Tell! Tell! Tell!' a grown up too!
- The children in **Y2** made lists of the personal information that they should not post online. They learned that people can steal their personal information and their accounts can be 'hacked'. They also talked about telling a grown up if they are worried and blocking those who approach them online.
- In Y3 the children learned that sometimes people they do not know may contact them. They explored what they should do if this happens. They created posters to demonstrate their learning.
- In **Y4** the children created their own videos about using the internet responsibly. These videos cover downloading apps, uploading images to the internet and being friends online with people they know.
- The children in **Y5** talked about why it is important to be kind to others when they online; when messaging; and when using social media. They also explored why their privacy is important and how it helps them to stay safe when online.
- In **Y6** the children explored the importance of using social media safely and appropriately and why certain social media sites like WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram, Snapchat and TikTok have age limits. They debated the reasons for having age restrictions and also discussed what they should do if they are contacted by someone they do not know online.

Fr Paul is now the Parish Priest of St Theresa's at Manor Top as well as Our Lady of Lourdes, and will celebrate Mass with St Theresa's Catholic Primary School this year as he did for us last year. Our Service will be at **9.30am** on **Wednesday 26th February 2020** in **Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church**. During the Service blessed ashes will be distributed just as they would during an Ash Wednesday Mass. Everyone is welcome!

Fastina

Lent is a time for giving things up. For Christians, it is one way we recall the time when Jesus fasted alone in the desert. Fasting is a test of self-discipline. Christians choose not to eat certain foods during Lent. Some fast on certain days; some give up drinking alcohol or eating meat and fish throughout Lent; some choose not to snack between meals or they give up something they enjoy e.g. biscuits and crisps as a token gesture.

Shrove Tuesday

The day before Lent starts is called Shrove Tuesday. This is also known as 'Pancake Day'! Traditionally this was the last chance to use up the foods Christians would not be eating during Lent.






The Great SJF Penny War 2020!

During Lent we will be collecting for one of our House charities, 'The Good Shepherd Appeal'. The popular SJF 'Penny War' will be making a return! We will therefore be collecting pennies and two-pennies. These will be placed in class collecting tins at the beginning of the school day. Each penny is worth one point and each two-pence piece is worth two points.

Silver coins can be used to sabotage another class' total. Any Silver coins deposited into another class tin will reduce the amount of points in that tin. So 5p will reduce a total by 5 points, 10p by 10 points, 50p by 50 points and so on. The tins will be placed in the school hall each lunchtime so the children can add 'sabotage' silver coins to another class tin if they want to. At the end of term the class tins will be opened and the 1p and 2p coins counted. Deductions resulting from the sabotage silver coins will also be made. The class with the most points will receive 'Golden Time'. The Great SJF Penny War 2020 begins on Ash Wednesday! Please support us!




STEM Week

The last week of Term 2 was STEM Week! In every class there was a special focus on subjects: **Science**, **Technology**, **Engineering** and course **Mathematics**. across school the children focused on

- ✓ asking great enquiry questions
- ✓ discussing key ideas
- ✓ hypothesising and investigating
- ✓ observing and representing results
- ✓ drawing conclusions
- ✓ designing and creating

The children had lots of fun developing and applying their STEM understanding and skills in different ways in order to find answers to questions and to create and then test their own theories and ideas! Their work will be displayed at our next Curriculum Exhibition Showcase on **Thursday 9th April 2020**.



STEM Week in FS2

This week FS2 made sandwiches for our Teddy bear party. We investigated the way the butter, jam and cheese spread, changing shape and melting. Then we experienced how the different fillings tasted!













STEM Week in Y1

The children of Y1 based their STEM week learning around the traditional tale 'The Three Little Pigs'. They were challenged to think about the properties of different materials that were used to build the houses and use key words to describe them, words such as: 'hard', 'soft', 'flexible', 'rigid', 'smooth', 'rough' and 'waterproof'.

The children then watched a video of heavy rain and realised that pigs do not like rain (not in their investigation anyway). They then planned and carried out a fair test in order to establish which was the best material to construct a roof from. They spent lots of time considering how to ensure that their test would be fair before carrying it out in small groups.



After making observations and gathering results they drew conclusions as to which were the best and least suitable materials to construct a roof capable of keeping the pigs dry. The children then designed and built a new house for the pigs!

STEM Week in Y2

During STEM week the young people of Y2 explored the life and achievements of John McAdam who is famous for discovering and developing a process called 'Macadamisation', now used commonly in the construction of roads.

The children could not believe how bad roads were before his discovery. His work is a perfect example of how science supported a design process in order to make life easier for many.

The children were astounded to know that we still use the same basic process for constructing roads today - have you heard of Tarmacadam, or tarmac?



STEM Week in Y3

This week we have explored our science topic through designing and creating a magnetic game.

We discussed what should be included within our design criteria and how we can make our games fun and link to Mathematics.

All our games highlighted the fact that magnets attract magnetic materials and included a points system created by the children.

It has been great fun designing and making our games.

STEM Week in Y4

This week in Y4 the children have been doing research about renewable energy and writing up their findings and conclusions. They gathered information on hydroelectricity, wind turbines, solar and geothermal energy.

Their investigations linked well to their current Science focus on electricity.

The pupils then planned and carried out their own fair scientific tests about conductors and insulators.









STEM Week in Y5

In Y5 the children investigated which cookies were the best for dunking into milk! The challenge was to plan and carry out a really good fair test. The children worked with a range of familiar biscuits including 'Rich Tea', chocolate digestives, bourbon creams, custard creams, ginger nuts and 'Oreo's'. The children had to predict first - and there were differing opinions as to which would be the best between ginger nuts and Oreo's. However everyone agreed that the eating of the samples was the best part of the process! Their tests produced some interesting results as well!



STEM Week in Y6

The young people of Y6 also linked their STEM Week learning to their current Science topic. Their challenge was to find out if and how pulse rates are affected by different forms of exercise. They undertook a scientific enquiry, first asking a question; then looking at the different variables before deciding on the one that would need to remain the same to ensure that the test was fair. They needed to hypothesise and consider what the raw data produced by the test would look like and how it could be presented to best show results.

Achievements Outside of School



We have again been approached by a number of our neighbours as well as parents and carers who are deeply concerned by the way some people are parking around school at the beginning and end of the school day. The parking restrictions exist to protect our pupils, your children and, of course, their families. Please park considerately, safely and lawfully. Thank you.

PLEASE DO <u>NOT</u> PARK:

- where there are 'zigzag' markings and double-yellow lines
- in the parish and school car parks without permission
- on pavements around school
- across neighbours' drives and places where the curb has been 'dropped'
- on grass verges

Illegal parking increases the level risk of accidents occurring and I sincerely hope that it does not take an actual accident to occur before the risks are taken seriously and accepted by everyone.

Inconsiderate parking also creates ill-feeling between school and our neighbours. Sadly, we have received a number of complaints recently, from those living around school who are very upset by the way some people park at both ends of the school day. They complain about being blocked in; about the grass verges (which they maintain) being churned up by parked cars; and by the verbal abuse some have allegedly been subjected to by those dropping off or picking up SJF pupils.

Complaints have also been made directly to the local authority and police, who will continue to monitor the situation. They also encourage anyone concerned to report issues to them. Ongoing patrols in marked and unmarked vehicles are also planned in order to support compliance and catch out those parked illegally.

Please help protect our children and their families, and support good relations with our neighbours too, by simply parking lawfully, safely and considerately – even if it means being a little further away from school.







A Visit to Remember...



Holocaust Memorial Day 2020 Stand Together

On Friday 31st January 2020, our Y6 pupils travelled to Beth Shalom, the National Holocaust Museum, near Ollerton in Nottinghamshire. As part of a focus linked to their World War Two topic they were investigating what life was like for different groups of people in 1930's Germany. The visit also coincided with Holocaust Memorial Day and so was an opportunity to reflect.



The children followed the life of a boy called Leo, a Jew, who lived in Berlin and learned about some of the challenges that he faced along with his family and countless other Jews during these very difficult times.

Here is a short recount of the day by Hibah and Tyler:

When we arrived, we walked past a flower garden with roses that had plaques on them naming all the Jewish people who had died. During the morning, we went on a journey experiencing what it was like living as a Jew in the second world war. It was very interesting and upsetting learning about how people used to treat others.

In the afternoon, we listened to a speaker who survived the Holocaust. She was 91 years old. Her story was about how she had to escape from Austria because of the rules that Jewish people had to obey. The survivor's story was sad but interesting and we got to learn a lot more about how Jewish people were treated.

This was a very reflective and interactive educational visit; allowing us to ask lots of questions and to reflect on the powerful and devastating events of this time.

At the Start of the Day...

Take photographs to remind you of the moment. Study a leaf, a flower, the bark on a tree in detail. What do you notice?






Observe its colours, smell, patterns and textures.
