OFSTED Report and Parent & Carer Meeting

Following the release of the OFSTED report I was keen to invite parents and carers to a special meeting to:

• explain what the category of 'Special Measures' means and what the ramifications are for our school;

- share what has been (and is being) done to drive the improvements necessary to get us out of this category and back to at least 'Good' as soon as possible; and
- give parents and carers an opportunity to ask questions and offer comments, opinions and ideas

For such an important meeting I was delighted that so many parents and carers were able to be present. I had a strong sense from those I spoke to at the end that it had met these objectives. Parents and carers shared views in a spirit of openness – and I am very glad they did. In one way, from the moment the school's situation became apparent to me, this whole year has been focused on beginning a process of improvement, by putting those systems in place that increase openness and transparency; that involve parents and carers more in school life by giving them information about the curriculum and about their children's targets, progress and attainment. As Headteacher I understand that I am accountable, and I accept this accountability willingly because I love this School and I have complete faith and belief that our special community will bounce back strongly.

That said - it is not all about me. It is about the ongoing development of strong partnerships between home, school, Governors, Diocese, local authority and our Catholic/local families of schools. It is about everyone pulling together with a shared vision for the future and an utter determination to do right by our children.

This process has started strongly and we have received lots of positive feedback about the direction that the school is now going in. We can never afford to be complacent or rest on our laurels as there is still much to do. Your involvement and support is key to our future success. I would like to thank Mr John Cape and Mrs Diane Stokes for facilitating the meeting as well as the colleagues and Governors who were present.

Staff News

I am delighted to welcome three new members of staff who will join our teaching team in September 2013. Governors have recruited two former local authority Early Years advisors to work as a job share in Foundation 2 (Reception); one of whom is Sue Rogers - who has already supported school so much this year already. Miss Sheena Rybka will also be joining our teaching team, taking responsibility for our Year 3 class next year. I would also like to inform you that Mrs Cope and Mrs Cooper have both tendered their resignations, which Governors accepted, and a process is already underway to recruit new staff for PPA cover. I would like to thank both Mrs Cope and Mrs Cooper for their hard work and dedication to St John Fisher and we wish them well in their future careers.

Transition Arrangements

I understand that children can become unsettled by the prospect of changing classes and having a new teacher. It was for this reason that I had introduced a transition day that was due to take place this week. The aim was to give children an opportunity to meet their new teacher(s) and the other staff who will be working with them. As a result of the huge staffing turnaround these plans have been scaled back, but we will do our best to give all children an opportunity to meet the staff who will be working with them.

As part of these arrangements parents and carers will have an opportunity to meet their child(ren)'s new teacher on the afternoon of one of the two INSET days booked in at the beginning of September. The purpose of these one-to-one meetings is to share assessment information and targets before school starts. A letter explaining the arrangements will be sent home shortly. At the beginning of next term there will also be a 'Welcome Meeting' for each year group; another opportunity to meet your child(ren)'s teaching and learning team and find out about the year ahead. I will be seeking feedback about these meetings.

Home visits were offered to the families of every child children joining our new Foundation 2 (Reception) class in September and every child is also having two full 'taster' days before the end of the year. Every child and their family will also have the chance to meet the Foundation 2 Teaching and learning team this Thursday at XXXpm.

Governor News

At Thursday's meeting for parents and carers Mr Cape announced that Governors had elected Mrs Sarah Ludlam to be the new Chair of Governors. Many of you will already know Sarah who is also a parent and member of our PTFA. Sarah will be supported by Miss Angela Wild, our Vice-Chair. Mr Cape also informed those present at the meeting that three new and outstanding Foundation Governors – each with very specific skill sets and experience – had been nominated to join the Governing body. We are just awaiting confirmation from Bishop John and the Trustees of Hallam Diocese that their nominations have been accepted. I know Sarah will be writing to you all shortly and will update you on the make-up of the Governing Body when she does.

I would like to take this opportunity to both recognise and thank Ms Sal Robinson for welcoming and supporting me since my appointment as Headteacher in September. As Chair, Ms Robinson met with me regularly to discuss issues and to advise, challenge and support me. Her commitment was incredible when you also consider that she, like all our Governors, is a volunteer. Her professionalism was also recognised by the OFSTED inspectors who visited school in May.

<u>Results</u>

I am delighted to inform you that our end of Key Stage statutory assessment results (SATs) in both Y2 and Y6 are much improved on previous years. The Y6 results are in line with the top 25% of schools in the country.
