Dear Parents and Carers.

This is the first curriculum overview of our new school year. Its purpose is to let you know what your children will be learning during the first term. We will also offer suggestions for supporting your children at home.

New learning can be fragile which is why it important to give our children the right kind of support in school and at home. If we get it right our children will feel positive and confident.

We do set homework in to support new learning and to encourage the children. Our expectations regarding homework will therefore also be shared in this overview.

Clearly, it is very important that all homework is attempted by the children on their own. If children do not understand something they should not worry. This means that the homework has done its job. If this is the case all we ask is that you simply reassure and encourage your children to do as much as they can. This will really help us understand where the gaps are so that the right support is offered.

If children have genuinely had a good go then we will always be proud of them, whatever they manage to finish and achieve.

We certainly do **not** want you or your children panicking or worrying. We also ask that you do not give your children too much help because this could end up masking an issue and cause problems in the longer term. Children will always be encouraged in our school, and all we ask is that they have a good go and do their very best. This is because children learn best when they are confident; children are most confident when they are happy; and children are most happy when they feel loved and supported.

We would rather that parents/carers simply notify staff in person, via the class email or by adding a note to the homework - confirming that the task was attempted and explaining what they believe the issues to be. We will pick this up and act - reassuring and encouraging the children all the time.

Methods and ways of teaching and learning change over time which is why we are always happy to explain them to you if you have a specific question or are not sure how to help your child at home. Please just ask. Sometimes it can actually be more confusing for a child when well-meaning parents/carers try to help them based on what they remember being taught, as this could be quite different to how children are taught now.

As always, if you can support us because you have a particular skill, specialist knowledge; a real-life experience, artefacts, or useful contacts to share – or if you can help with an educational visit or with activities in class, please speak to your child's teacher(s). Thank you for your support.

Home Learning for Children Isolating Due to COVID-19

Children who are unwell because of COVID-19 will not be expected to undertake home learning. Children who are well, symptom-free and isolating in line with guidance will be expected to undertake home learning activities. Initially an SJF 'Isolation Pack' will be sent home and/or made available from our SJF 'Home Learning' portal. Up-to-date work, linked to what classmates are doing in class, will then be shared via Microsoft Teams and the 'Home Learning' portal just as it was during the national lockdown.

Please contact us immediately if your child is isolating and you are struggling in any way to access the home learning activities and opportunities we are providing for them. Perhaps you have Wi-Fi issues preventing your child from getting online or you do not have enough IT kit at home? We will do all we can to support you.

English: Basic Skills – Reading, Phonics, Spelling and Handwriting

Spelling, Punctuation, Grammar & Handwriting

All children will benefit from having daily handwriting and spelling practise, and regular grammar and punctuation sessions focused on meeting their individual needs. Children all have individual targets for writing, such as including specific punctuation or using descriptive language and these will be focussed on throughout all their writing.

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ supporting them to learn their weekly spellings
- ✓ looking at synonyms and antonyms.
- √ talking about their targets for writing

Reciprocal reading

All children will have daily access to reading resources and twice each week will be completing reciprocal reading which will help to improve their confidence, enjoyment and develop comprehension skills.





You can support your child's learning at home by:

- reading their own books with them for a few minutes every day
- ✓ choosing another book by the same author, to read with your child
- ✓ encouraging your child to read a wider range of more challenging books, to widen their experience
- √ discussing their personal targets for reading (as shared on their record sheet)

Mathematics

This term we will be focusing on the new Y4 mathematics. We will be looking at this term:

- mental calculation strategies
- place value
- Formal calculation methods

Key words we will be using are:

- ✓ columns
- ✓ operations
- ✓ digits
- ✓ symbols
- √ calculations

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- √ adding, subtracting and multiplying two digit numbers
- √ talking about numbers and what each digit means in numbers to 100 000

Humanities

Our focus will be the timeline and society of the Anglo-Saxons and the Scots. We will learn about their daily lives and how they changed Britain. The children will be investigate Anglo-Saxon gods and goddesses.

Key words we will be using are:

- ✓ tanner
- ✓ angles
- ✓ Woden
- √ weaving
- √ Saxon

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ researching the Anglo –Saxon settlement of England and what was happening in Scotland at the time
- evaluating the different ways that we find out about the past and how we can use historical evidence

PE

The children will benefit from a programme called Real PE. This term the children will develop personal skills with a focus on physical co-ordination and balance linked to Basketball.

Key words we will be using are:

- √ agility/balance
- √ coordination
- ✓ catchina
- √ bouncing
- √ throwing

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- 🗸 encouraging your child to demonstrate what they have done in their REAL PE lesson
- ✓ encouraging your child to practice catching and throwing.
- √ playing games in your garden or in the park, particularly running, chasing and ball skills







Science

This term our Science will be focused on Animals including humans. We will be:

- describing the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system in humans
- identifying the different types of teeth in humans and their functions
- constructing and interpreting different food chains, identifying producers, prey and predators

Key words we will be using are:

- ✓ producer
- ✓ consumer
- √ digestion
- ✓ molar
- √ canines

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- talking about what producers, predators and prey, giving examples
- ✓ investigating and discussing the ways the body works
- ✓ researching different animals' digestive systems and teeth

Music

Music is now being delivered by a specialist teacher from Junior Jam. The children will follow the National Curriculum in a COVID-secure way to ensure that they can enjoy and achieve safely.



In the 'Play It Again' unit, children will:

- explore rhythmic patterns
- learn to recognise repeated and rhythmic patterns
- perform a repeated pattern to a steady pulse with an awareness of different parts
- invent lyrics to fit a set rhythm pattern and review work in order to make improvements

Key words we will be using are:

- ✓ rhythm
- ✓ pitch
- √ tempo
- √ repetition

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ encouraging your child to practise making improvements to their work
- ✓ listening to music with a repeated pattern compare tempos

Art and DT

Linked to our Humanities study, the children will be learning about the learning about Anglo-Saxon artefacts and designing and creating their own versions. They will also evaluate and adapt their techniques as part of a continuous cycle of learning.

Key words we will be using are:

- ✓ patterns
- √ textures
- ✓ depths
- √ shades

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ discussing how a variety of objects could be made.
- ✓ encouraging your child to attempt to design and/or make models.





French

The lessons will be delivered by a specialist French teacher from the highly regarded Primary Languages Network. There will be a period of assessment during which the children will revisit previous learning in order to prepare for the Y4 curriculum in the year ahead.



Computing

This term our focus is 'We are Co-Authors'. We will create our own Wikipedia pages that focus on different aspects of Anglo-Saxon daily life that we have first investigated.

Key words we will be using are:

- √ typing
- ✓ editing
- √ formatting
- √ text

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ looking at Wikipedia pages about your child's favourite topics and look at how the information if created and added/edited.
- ✓ practising using typing in a Word document.

PSHCE

We will be learning about the caring school, feelings, friends and family, and also appreciating differences. The children will be learning to develop, consider and apply inter-person skills to help teamwork. They will also be evaluating and adapting their techniques as part of continuous cycle of learning.

Key words we will be using are:

- √ friendship
- √ teamwork
- ✓ caring
- ✓ Kindness

You can support your child's learning at home by:

- ✓ discussing how friendships change and develop as you grow up.
- encouraging your child to attempt to talk to other children in the school other than their friends
