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Bad Weather

The decision to open, open late or close is always a difficult one to make – especially when the weather is so changeable. We will always try to make a firm decision as early as possible so that you have time to make alternative arrangements if necessary. This week has presented us with all sorts of challenges because of the bad weather, and I would like to thank you for your patience, understanding and support.

Building Work Update

Work continues in the Y1 classroom. The wall has been rebuilt and the new windows are due to go in next week which will make the room weatherproof. The new fire exit that will also provide access to the outdoor play/learning area has also been knocked through. The Y2 classroom has been stripped out in readiness for its refurbishment. The new fitted cupboards that will replace the open shelves are being built along the FS2/KS1 corridor. More internal doors have been replaced with new fire doors and you will not be surprised to learn that almost all the doors and frames are different sizes! Work on the installation of the new alarms/sensors also continues. The wall between the new kitchen servery and the hall has been knocked through and the steels have been added above what will become the new serving hatch and doorway. The joists have also been installed in readiness for work to start on the servery roof next week.

FS2 is currently accessible by the external entrance whilst work continues in the corridor. It is inevitable that different areas of school will be completely closed off to children and staff whilst work is carried out in them. This is because the safety of children, staff and contractors is of prime concern at all times.

Focus Group

Last Wednesday a focus group made up of some parents and staff met to discuss the current mini-report format and homework. It was a really positive meeting in which lots of opinions and ideas were shared. As a result a number of actions emerged including:

- the production a new format for the mini-report which is shared after each assessment point
- ✓ the addition of an explanation on the report so that parents/carers understand it including the judgments on aspects of attitude
- ✓ a commitment to run workshops to:
 - a) explain the revised report format and give parents/carers an opportunity to ask questions
 - b) explain our new assessment system following the Government's decision to drop the familiar 'Levels'
- a commitment to add an explanation to the website so that parent/carers can access it any time
- ✓ a commitment to produce a parent/carer guide regarding homework that sets out clearly our view of its
 purpose and role in supporting pupils' new knowledge and understanding
- ✓ the organisation of further parent/carer workshops on:
 - a) the addition, subtraction, multiplication and division calculation strategies taught in school
 - b) the teaching and learning of phonics
 - c) how to support writing development
- ✓ a commitment to include parents/carer help guides for calculation strategies on the website

We will also be sharing ideas for a revised annual report format as part of this process. I would like to thank the parents, carers and colleagues who gave so generously of their time in order to get involved and help us. This is why, in the 2013-14 academic year, I engaged in a partnership with 'Sheffield Links' to provide a wider range of activities for children from Year 1 through to Y6 each week. Initially the response was great and many groups were oversubscribed, but since then attendance has steadily declined. I had subsidised the clubs quite heavily in order to keep the subs down and promote engagement, however, this is not sustainable indefinitely.

Mrs Broadhead, who is now responsible for PE (including after-school sports clubs), has been seeking feedback – including from the children - about what we can do to increase participation. We are happy to look at everything, including the range of competitive and non-competitive activities on offer. If you have an opinion or idea to share please get in touch if you have not already done so. It would be a huge shame to cancel the clubs or limit opportunities, but that might become the reality, sadly, if the demand is not there.
