C-Safey

The **e**-Safety section of the website has been updated with lots of information and links to keep you informed about the risks and the steps you can take as parents and carers to minimise/eliminate those risks.

Technology is advancing at a tremendous rate and has never been so accessible to children and young people. When used safely and appropriately it can be extremely positive, however the greater the access – the greater the threats. Sadly it is all too easy for children to be exposed to the risk of viewing inappropriate material, cyber-bullying and other forms of exploitation through their use of their own or others' mobile phones, PCs, tablets, iPods and even X-Box/Playstation-type systems that enable users to connect via the internet. It is not always to establish the identities and motives of the people they can connect with.

At St John Fisher we take e-Safety very seriously. The children have been learning about e-Safety this term as part of their computing curriculum and in the last week of term they have been shown the new section on the website - which contains age-appropriate information and activities. A CEOP link is also now available at the bottom of each page of website enabling you to report anything risky directly to the authorities.

We are planning some further parent/carer workshops for later this academic year and are developing ideas for an annual 'Be Safe/Be Happy Week' which will take place each November from 2015 (to coincide with anti-bullying week) in which a whole range of issues – including e-Safety - will be explored to compliment the on-going work done throughout the year. I do hope as many of you as possible will sign up for the parent information workshops when they are announced. Thank you.

Parking Complaints

Since Christmas I have received a number of complaints from local residents about parking at the beginning and the end of the school day. Two particular concerns are:

- 1. grass verges being churned up because cars are parked on them
- 2. residents' driveways being completely or partially blocked by parked cars so they cannot enter/leave

The complainants who phoned me described occasions when they have not been able to leave for work on time or have been late for important appointments at the hospital because cars parked cars at the beginning and/or end of the school day have blocked them in or prevented them from returning.


This girls and boys of **Y3** will receive a visit from Bobby Bear when we return from holiday for having the best attendance in the last week of Term 3. The boys and girls of **Y2** were second and will receive a visit from Brenda. The children of **Y5** were third and will be visited by Elvis. The average was well below our 97% target.

There have been some nasty cold viruses going around which have inevitably led to a number of children needing to be off school. However it is the unauthorised term-time holidays that have the biggest impact.

Of the 365 days in a year only 190 are spent in school. Though some absence during this time can be unavoidable it does mean that there are 175 days to spend as a family for visits, breaks and holidays.

The attendance data of schools and academies are scrutinised closely by the authorities and also form a key part of the evidence considered by Ofsted when judging the effectiveness of a school or academy. The following tables have been produced to illustrate the impact of persistent absence:
