I would like to recognise the hard work and dedication of Mrs Broadhead in earning us this second award. We are very grateful to her.


Yesterday the children in Y4 went on a very exciting trip to Chatsworth Park in the heart of Derbyshire. The reason for this trip was to follow up on work done in both geography (rivers) and science (habitats). The children walked into the park and really amazed the adults with their knowledge of rivers (thank you Mrs Raynes). They were able to identify that the River Derwent that runs through Chatsworth is the middle course of the river and they identified a number of different features: flood plains, tributaries, a weir, a beach and a number of deltas. We saw how the river is cutting through the park and moving, creating the beginnings of an oxbow lake.


Afterwards the children undertook some work on habitats. The looked at the tree in Chatsworth and were able to identify the following trees using guides: oak, sycamore, hawthorn, cherry, elm, sweet chestnut,

horse chestnut, lime, beech, birch hornbeam and London plane. The children use the guides well and also identified wild flowers and insects that have the park as their habitat. The children also understood that a tree in itself could be a habitat and found an oak tree was home to: a fungus, rabbits, birds, squirrels and a variety of insects and arachnids.

At the end of the day the children used their water colour paintings skills (which they have been working on all year) to paint the landscapes they saw in front of them.

The children had a wonderful time and really learnt a lot on their visit. A big thank you to Mrs Battams, Mrs

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
