

Virtues to Live By

As part of our prayer programme this year, and in common with other Hallam Diocese Catholic schools we are introducing "Our Virtues to Live By". These are a cluster of human virtues which make up the key virtue of love. We will focus on two virtues each term in order to deepen our understanding and appreciation of the essential role the virtues play in the formation and education of the whole person towards human flourishing.

QUA VIRTUES TO LINE 8^t

The virtues chosen are common across cultures and faiths, but are sourced from the Christian tradition. This term we will focus on (i) **respect & courtesy** and (ii) **thanksgiving**. We will encourage our whole school community to live the virtue here at St John Fisher in our thinking, decisions and actions.

Harvest Campaign

Our new Chaplains will be leading this year's Harvest campaign, collecting dried food and tins for The St Wilfrid Centre. It is important that donated food is **non-perishable**, so items such as tins of meat, fish, soup, vegetables and fruit; packets of cereals, dried 'Pot Noodle'-type products, biscuits, drinking chocolate, instant mashed potato, pasta, rice and dried noodles are ideal. Anything tinned or dried is perfect. All donations will be received gratefully from Monday and can be left in the box at the pedestrian gate at the beginning and end of each the school day. SJF Black History Fortnight

Next week we begin a two week focus on black history focusing on key figures from the recent and more distant past. The children will explore bla ck history, heritage, culture and achievements in their classes.


During Black History Week, the children will listen to a story about Bessie Coleman who defied all the odds in order to achieve her dream to become the first female pilot almost a century ago, in 1922.

The children will also reflect on their own dreams and think about what we hope to do when we are older. The children will share these with each other as we do lots of drama work around this. Bessie Coleman is inspirational and encourages us all to dream big!!



During Black History Month our Y2 children will be learning about the nurse, Mary Seacole who was a British-Jamaican nurse who set up the "British Hotel" behind the lines during the Crimean War (1853-56). Coming from a tradition of Jamaican and West African 'doctresses', Mary Seacole displayed "compassion, skills and bravery whilst nursing injured soldiers. She was awarded the Jamaican Order of Merit posthumously in 1991 and in 2004, she was voted the greatest black Briton.

The children of Y2 will write a non-chronological report about her life and continue to develop art skills as they draw portraits. There will be a focus on her life as a significant individual in the past who has contributed so much.



We will also be building upon our geography skills locating Jamaica and looking at the physical features of the country as well learning about the significance of the design and colours of the Jamaican flag.









Y4

The children in Y4 will focus on the well-known Hollywood actor Morgan Freeman.

A key focus is linked to art curriculum and the development of pencil observational drawing skills, with a focus on facial features, as the children produce their own detailed pencil portraits of him.

The children will also be researching and writing about his life in the form of a biography.



Over the next two weeks, the children of Y5 will focus on Martin Luther King and the Civil rights movement in America during the 1950s and 60s. We will learn about Martin Luther King's iconic 'I have a dream' speech and reflect on it meaning and impact.

We will also focus on Rosa Parks and the simple and peaceful stand that

We will link to our work in RE and our Virtues to live by-particularly our virtue of Respect.



During Black History Month, the Y6 children will be focusing on the life and career of Olympic athlete, Jesse Owens. They will explore how his athletic success contrasted sharply with the racism directed towards black people, both in the USA and abroad in the twentieth century.

This work will link to our forthcoming history unit that focuses on the Second World War, as we contrast and compare the persecution of black people in the USA during the 1900s with that of the Jewish people during WW2.

Finally, we aim to produce a diary entry from the point of view of Owens following his success at the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin.



For Black History fortnight FS2 will be learning about the life of Faith Ringold and her beautiful artwork.

This will link with our work on communities and making art through different material.

We will also take a brief look at the art work of Basquiat and consider how it makes us feel.


This will link with work we are doing on exploring and talking about different emotions.



When Malala was born in Mingora, Pakistan, her father was determined she would have every opportunity that a boy would have. She loved getting an education, but when a hateful regime came to power, girls were not allowed to go to school.

Malala spoke out in public about this, which made her a target for violence. She was shot in the left side of her head and woke up in hospital in England. Finally, after long months and many surgeries, Malala recovered, and resolved to become an activist for girls' education. Now a recent Oxford graduate, Malala continues to fight for a world where all girls can learn and lead.

This powerful book features stylish illustrations and extra facts at the back, including a biographical timeline with historical photos and a detailed profile of Malala's life.
