The reality is that COVID continues to be ever present in our city and local community, resulting in high numbers of new infections and reinfections. We continue to monitor the situation closely and if advised, we will adjust routines and reintroduce measures. In the meantime, it is vitally important that children who are fit and well do attend school as often as possible. Please avoid unnecessary absences, including term-time holidays, except when circumstances are truly exceptional. Unauthorised term-time holidays have contributed to our low overall attendance figures.

Holy Week Explained

The last week of the holiday is Holy Week and here is an explanation from the Catholic Family Website (here)

Holy Week is a wonderful season of services and Masses that help us to reflect on the mystery of God's love. Easter can make us uncomfortable because it challenges us to acknowledge our own sinfulness, when we would rather believe that our weaknesses are acceptable, but this is the point of Easter. Easter is a time for a new spiritual discipline; a chance to meditate on our own imperfections and stand in awe of the radical love of a God who died to set us free.









Palm Sunday (10-04-22)

The Service is slightly longer than a usual Sunday Mass which marks the beginning of Holy Week. We begin by reading a recount of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on a donkey. Palms are blessed with holy water. This part of the service can take place outside, but if not practical, can take place inside before Mass begins.

The Gospel reading recounts the whole passion story, which is why this day is also known as "Passion Sunday". Palm Sunday has a bitter-sweet tone. On the one hand the story is upbeat with the crowd joyfully proclaiming Christ as the long-promised Messiah, yet by the end of the week, he is executed brutally.

Holy Thursday (14-04-22)

In the morning is the **Chrism Mass** where the holy oils are blessed by the Bishop at the Cathedral, along with as many Diocesan priests as available, for use during the coming year.

In the evening is the **Mass of the Lord's Supper**. This includes the washing of the feet. It is the night of Our Lord's last meal with his Disciples; His torment in the Garden of Gethsemane; His betrayal by Judas, arrest and trial.

Mass is concluded with the stripping of the sanctuary of all decoration (flowers, altar cloth, banners etc) and by the transfer of the Eucharist from the tabernacle to the Altar of Repose (usually a side altar). Everyone is then invited to stay in church for a while afterwards to 'keep watch' with Christ, as Jesus asked *His* disciples to keep watch while he prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane (known as the Agony in the Garden).

Good Friday (15-04-22)

"It was now about the sixth hour and, with the sun eclipsed, a darkness came over the land until the ninth hour. The veil of the temple was torn right down the middle; and when Jesus had cried out in a loud voice, he said, 'Father, into your hands I commend my spirit.' With these words he breathed his last." (Luke 22)

Stations: There are two approved versions. Most churches observe the tradition of having 14 stations displayed on the walls of the church, a tradition dating back to St Francis of Assisi. Pope John Paul II instigated the Scriptural Way of the Cross which includes the Agony in the Garden and an optional 15th for the Resurrection.

Celebration of the Lord's Passion: This is not a Mass but is a communion service with the veneration of the Cross where people are invited to kiss the feet of Jesus on a crucifix. The readings recount the passion of Jesus and the mood is sombre. The service takes place at 3pm as we understood this to be the time when Jesus died.

Holy Saturday (16-04-22)

The Vigil Mass on Holy Saturday is the peak service of the Church calendar and has four parts:

- 1. Service of Light: the church is in darkness; the people gather around a large fire from which the new Paschal candle is lit. The light is then spread from person to person until all have a lit candle.
- 2. Liturgy of the Word: There are nine readings. They begin with creation and retell the story of redemption.
- 3. Liturgy of Baptism and Confirmation: This is when new members to the Church are baptised/confirmed.
- 4. Liturgy of the Eucharist: The newly baptised present the bread and wine and make their first communion.

Easter Sunday (17-04-22)

This Mass is all about the Resurrection of Jesus! It is because Jesus rose from the dead on a Sunday that Christians call Sunday, 'The Day of the Lord'. This differentiates Christian tradition from the Jewish Sabbath which is on a Saturday. The word 'Alleluia', which has not been said at all during Lent returns as a victory cry!

Lenten Class Liturgies

Thank you to everyone who joined us for our class liturgies during Lent. These have been special and important moments in our school life, when the children (and staff) have been able to pause and reflect on their day, their hopes and challenges; and their personal Lenten journeys. We are glad that so many could join us.

Resurrection Mass 2022

Our annual Resurrection Mass, takes place on Friday 22nd April 2022, at 10.00am in Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church. Please note the time, as it is a slightly later start than our usual time. The liturgy will be led by the young people of 14 and we again thank Fr Bede for leading our celebration and for giving us permission to record the Mass so that those in our community who are unable to attend will be able watch it via this link. SJF Chaplaincy Team Update: Extension of the SJF Penny War

We have decided to extend our 2022 Penny War in support of the bishop's 'Good Shepherd Appeal' into the first two weeks of the new term. The pupils are invited to collect pennies and two-pence pieces in their individual class collecting jars



A **penny** is worth **one point** and a **two-pence piece** is worth **two points**. However, silver coins can be used to sabotage another class's total because silver coins deposited into the jar of another class jar will reduce the total number of points in that jar. A **5p** piece will reduce the total number of points accumulated by **5** points, **10p** will reduce the total by **10** points, **20p** by **20** points and **50p** by **50** points.



At the end of the week the coins will be counted and once all deductions have been made, the victorious class will be announced and rewarded with some 'Golden Time'. All money raised will be passed on to support the vital work of our Diocesan caring services.







Statement of Belief


Our next 'Statement of Belief' is "I know what humility means."
