School Attendance & Absence Why is attendance important? Well, going to school regularly is important for every child's future.

Parents/carers are responsible for making sure their children receive a full education. They have to make sure that their children go to school otherwise they can be fined or even prosecuted.

#### Benefits of Good Attendance

Good attendance at school is not just valuable, it's essential. Going to school is linked, directly, to improved exam performance which can in turn lead to further learning opportunities and better job prospects. As well as this, going to school helps to develop:


- friendships
- social skills
- team values
- life skills
- cultural awareness
- career pathways

#### Important

You can help your child by:

- having a good routine from an early age and sticking it to it
- helping your child understands the importance of good attendance and punctuality
- asking your child about school work and encouraging them to join in with school activities
- sharing any problems or concerns they may have with their teacher or the headteacher
- not letting them take time off school for minor ailments or holidays during term time







To avoid disrupting your child's education, you should arrange (as far as possible), appointments and outings:

- after school hours
- at weekends
- during school holidays

### Term-Time Holidays

Term time holidays have been increasing in schools across Sheffield, over the last number of years. The advice is that parents/carers should make every effort to make sure that their child does not miss school due to holiday plans. Schools are not obliged to agree to you taking your child on holiday during term time.

### Issues that can Impact on Attendance

A child's school attendance can be affected if there are problems with:

- bullying
- housing or care arrangements
- transport to and from school
- work and money
- other problems at home

If your child starts missing school, you might not know there is a problem. When you find out, ask your child and then approach their teacher.
