The government is extremely concerned about school attendance figures, nationally, since the pandemic, and has issued guidance to challenge and support both local authorities and schools to do more to ensure that they improve.

Sheffield has been identified as an area where attendance figures are particularly poor. In response, the local authority is working closely with all schools to drive up attendance across the city.

Though our figures were consistently strong prior to the pandemic, they, along with other schools, have dropped significantly since. At 86.2%, the overall figures in final week of Term 2 raised concerns, for example.

There are a number of justifiable and unavoidable reasons for this. Firstly, COVID is still about, and children must stay away from school if they test positive. There have also been a number of horrible viruses circulating, including winter flu, and illnesses like chicken pox and vomiting viruses that particularly affected our pupils over the autumn terms. We very much appreciate the efforts of parents/carers to get their children in to school, and are fully aware that on many occasions we were the ones who called and requested for them to be taken home and kept off, in line with public health advice, to limit the risk of spreading germs in school.

What has been picked up, by the local authority, is the high number of *avoidable* term-time holidays still being requested/taken by our families. In line with guidance, these can rarely be approved. To be authorised, the circumstances have to be truly exceptional and consideration will also be given to how often children from the same families are withdrawn from school to go on term-time breaks. The government expectation is clear. Children must be in school <u>every day</u> during term time, unless they are unwell; have appointments that cannot be made outside of the school day/term time; or the reason for leave is absolutely compelling or exceptional.

Consideration of requests, is made on a case-by-case basis, and will take account of all the information that is shared as part of the request. This is important if parents/carers want to demonstrate that the timing of their request is genuinely unavoidable. Though a huge consideration, at this time of rising costs, the fact that holidays/flights are cheaper in term-time will never meet the threshold for being an 'exceptional' reason.

There are 190 school days out of a total of 365 days in a non-leap year, including training days. This leaves 175 days to be used for breaks of one kind or another. Please support us to reduce term-time holidays. Thank you.

This year, their visit coincides with International Holocaust Memorial Day. Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) takes place on 27<sup>th</sup> January each year and is a time to remember the millions of people murdered during the Holocaust, under Nazi Persecution and in the genocides which followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur (in Sudan).

The aims of the day are laid out in the **statement of commitment**. Its commemoration here in school aligns with both our British values and Catholic ethos, and serves as a real demonstration of how the lessons of the past can inform our lives today and ensure that everyone continues to work together in order to create a safer and better future.

It is important that lessons are learned in age-appropriate ways because it is not inevitable that these terrible events of the past will not happen again and again and again. Educating our young to be accepting and respectful of others - of difference - is absolutely key, and wholly in line with our Catholic ethos and values.

"People may think that they have nothing to do with my story. But what happened to me, could happen to them – to people like yourself. It may sound too hard to believe but this doesn't happen to strangers who live far away. I'm just an ordinary person. These terrible things can happen to people like us."


