Update: Strike Action

I emailed and wrote to parents and carers earlier in the week about the strike action being taken by members of the National Education Union (NEU) union across England on the following dates:

Wednesday	Tuesday	Wednesday	Thursday
1st February 2023	28 th February 2023	15 th March 2023	16th March 2023

Though it is very difficult to determine exactly how the NEU strike action will affect our school, we have worked hard, since the results of the various different union strike ballots were announced, to assess the impact of action on staffing levels in our school. As explained in the letter, it is difficult to plan with any certainty because teachers do not have to disclose whether they are members of the NEU, nor do they have to say whether they intend striking. They can choose to strike on all/some/none of the designated days and can be absent without giving any prior warning. The purpose of strikes is to cause disruption as part of a day of action.

The rules do allow us to invite colleagues to let us know what their intentions are, if they want to, and we have done this. So far, the indications are that all staff will be in. At the moment, this means that school will open fully on the strike days, though NEU members can change their minds at any time, without giving notice. It therefore makes sense to prepare. Even though we believe that school will open as usual, it is a good idea to have childcare in place just in case anything changes. If the situation does have to change, we will, of course, follow published government guidance and share details of our plans with you as soon as we can.

The Y6 Visit to the National Holocaust Centre & Museum

The young people of Y6 visited Beth Shalom, near Ollerton in Nottinghamshire, on Thursday to support their understanding of the reasons behind the persecution of the Jews and other groups under the tyrannical Nazis regime in power in Germany from 1933-1945.













They also had an opportunity to reflect on the terrible impact on ordinary children like them, including Anne Frank and Robert Norton, a Holocaust survivor they had the honour of meeting on the day. It was fitting that their visit came in the same week as Holocaust Memorial Day, which always takes place on 27th January.

Mr Macinness Writes:

Ahead of National Holocaust Memorial Day this week, our Y6 class were fortunate enough to experience a fascinating tour of the National Holocaust Museum. This educational visit helped to build on numerous areas of our study, including the First and Second World Wars, the emergence of the Nazi party and the broader concepts of prejudice and discrimination.







Through exploring and investigating various replica settings of 1930s/40s Germany, the children learnt about key events which led to the persecution of the Jewish community, such as the effects of Nazi propaganda on German children's education, the Kindertransport initiative and 'Kristallnacht' (Night of Broken Glass).







Following this, they were hugely privileged to meet Robert Norton, a Jewish survivor of the Holocaust. Our Y6 children listened intently as Robert told us the story of how he and his parents escaped their Czechoslovakian hometown close to the German border and travelled across Europe, much of which was under Nazi control, towards France and, ultimately, to safety in London.

The children were then able to ask Robert their own questions, about his life and the persecution he and his family suffered. He was gentle and open. Our time with Robert was both fascinating and inspirational and afterwards he commented on how well-behaved, respectful, well-mannered and engaged our children had been. We would like to thank everyone at Beth Shalom, especially Robert, for making us feel so welcome and for helping us learn about tolerance, discrimination and the history of the Holocaust in such an engaging way.

Our Y3 Roman Adventure at The Yorkshire Museum of Farming (Mrs Broadhead)



What a wonderful day we have had! Our Y3 children were given the opportunity to experience a day as a Roman soldier! The children had to be auxiliaries, rather than 'full' Roman soldiers, because they were from Britannia and it meant that the Romans considered them to be Celts still.

Road Markings & Bollards

Following the meeting with our SJF School Councillors, Mrs Vickers was so impressed by our children and wanted to follow up some of the issues raised - and ideas discussed - which our Council will now take forward. We talked about some of the wider concerns that are raised, fairly regularly to me by neighbours, parents and carers. Within days the road markings had been repainted, and someone came to school to discuss the positioning of two new bollards between the two gates to the staff/visitor car park. These will prevent drivers parking cars illegally on the pavement. She has also arranged for wardens to visit us more frequently too.
