SJF Black History Month 2019

Y5: For Black History Month, Y5 have been learning about the incredible life of Nelson Mandela. We have researched the different stages of his life, from his humble beginnings in the village of Mvezo to his election as the first black President of South Africa in 1994. In English, we have written some fantastic first person accounts of his imprisonment on Robben Island.





Y6: We learned about the inspiring story of the American sprinter, Jesse Owens. From humble beginnings in Cleveland Ohio, he went on to break world records at 100m, 200m and long jump! He achieved worldwide fame at the 1936 Berlin Olympics where he won four gold medals, beating Adolf Hitler's German athletes and undermining Nazi racial propaganda in order to become the most successful athlete of the games! Today the 'Jesse Owen Award' is the highest track and field achievement in the USA! In our English lessons we wrote some excellent recounts of Jesse Owens winning the 100m sprint in the Olympics!

Be Safe - Be Happy Week 2019



This week we held our annual 'Be Safe- Be Happy Week'! It turned out to be a fun-packed week put together in order to help our children understand the importance of making good choices and to develop their knowledge about the potential hazards and dangers that are around them.

During the week lots of important messages were also shared about respecting others and being intolerant of bullying so that our children can feel happy, safe and loved in and out of school every day.







Odd Socks Day

Today was 'odd socks Day' and we celebrated the fact that we are all different and unique. In other places Odd Socks Day is being celebrated on Tuesday 12th November, but brought it forward so that it could be part of our Be Safe - Be Happy Week 2019!



This special day highlighted the fact that bullying is usually targeted at people who are different, or who are the same but are just perceived to be different - by others who are perhaps a little insecure themselves, fearful and/or less open to difference.

We investigated the different forms that bullying can take, and explored what the impact can be on the victims. The children also had personal safety lessons using various NSPCC resources.

Odd Socks Day is also about remembering that we must always be respectful and supportive of others too, because bullying can never take root in those special places where everyone is respectful and supportive of each other.

Monday

We welcomed Firefighter Rushby to KS2 from the South Yorkshire Fire & Rescue Service who spoke to the classes about fire prevention in the home and what to do if a fire is discovered. We now know that we need to:

- ✓ tell a grown up and evacuate the building as soon as possible
- never hide- remain near an open window if you are unable to leave the building
- limit the chances of a fire starting by making sure things are unplugged and phones are not charging overnight (especially under pillows whilst sleeping)
- ✓ shut all doors at night



Our K\$1 children were visited by Nurse Denham, who is also one of our parents. Nurse Denham talked about germs and how they can be spread so easily. She explained to the children about the importance of good hygiene for protecting ourselves and others from bad germs. The children learned why it is important to cover their mouths when they cough or sneeze and why they should always wash their hands thoroughly after using the toilet, after they have finished playing outside and before they eat.















The children also learned why it is important to stay away from tools that they might come across.





Wednesday

Our KS1 children were visited by 'Fireman Sam' who explained how to keep safe in the home. He also explained about the different equipment firemen use to protect themselves when they attend a fire.

Tuesday

Mr Paige joined us to explain why building sites are not playgrounds, even if they look like exciting places to explore. The children learned that even well managed building sites are full of hidden dangers to those people who should not be there.



We also met a representative from Yorkshire Water who visited school in order to talk about the importance of being sensible and safe near open water, rivers, canals, reservoirs and lakes.

Every year in the UK a number of children are injured or killed playing near water and so the purpose of the session was to make the children aware of the dangers.

This was followed in KS2 with workshops about how the water is cleaned before we are able to drink it. We learned all about the different stages that water goes through before it makes it back to our taps! We even made a simple water filter to show how water is cleaned! It was fascinating and the children had an exciting time learning.

Foundation Governors must be practicing Catholics. They are nominated by Parish Priests and appointed by the Bishop. As the Bishop's appointees, Foundation Governors' primary responsibility is to safeguard the Catholic foundation and nature of the school in terms of our strategic direction.

Parent Governors

The Governing Body of all Sheffield Schools and academies have at least one place reserved for a Parent/Carer Governor. Unlike a Foundation Governor, a Parent Governor *must* have a child at school. Crucially Parent Governors do not have to be a Catholic, though they must commit to supporting our Catholic ethos. Therefore it is a wonderful opportunity for any member of our community who is passionate about our school, to join our Governing Body and support us on our onward journey. The term of office for Parent Governor is four years.

Being a Governor is special. It is a chance for you to influence school life and the education we provide for all our children. Lots of information is shared so that Governors can offer advice and make key strategic decisions about many aspects of school life including the curriculum, staffing and finances. We would especially welcome enquiries from anyone who has a background/skillset linked to education, business, finance, law, health and safety, fundraising and human resources.

All new Governors will have access to training and the support of experienced Governors to help them understand their new role and responsibilities.

Parent Governors also provide a link between the school and parents and carers. The Parent Governor will be expected to attend at least three full meetings of the School Governing Body each year long as well as meetings for one of the three SJF Governor sub-committees.

Term 2 Learning Value

Here is an update from Mrs Broadhead and our Young Leaders:

What is honesty?

Many children think honesty means you "don't tell a lie", and that is definitely part of being honest. However, honesty means more than just not lying.

A more complete definition of honesty shows that an honest person does not do things that are morally wrong.

If something you do is breaking the law or if you have to hide what you are doing because you know you will get in trouble, then you are probably not being honest. So honesty is about speaking and acting truthfully.

Honesty in what you say

Honesty is speaking the truth, it is not...

- saying things that are not true
- saying things you think might not be true
- making things up in order to hide the truth

Lying is dishonest because you are saying something that isn't true.



Honesty in what you do

Honesty is acting with integrity. Being honest means you act in a way that you know is right. Dishonesty is when you do something you know is wrong, morally, or when you have to hide your actions because you know they are wrong.

Honesty in yourself

A big part of honesty is what you say and how you act toward others. However, another part of the definition of honesty is whether you treat yourself in the same way. Being honest with yourself means you really know why you are acting in a certain way; whether what you tell yourself is true; and whether you are really being true to yourself, your values and what you believe.

Statement to Live By

Our statement next week will be 'I try to be just and fair'.

Time to talk:

Together think about what the word 'just' means. Why is it important to be treated fairly? What does it feel like to be treated unfairly? If you know someone is being treated unjustly and unfairly what should you do? Who can you tell? Remember, everyone has the right to feel happy, safe and loved – every day.
